Reading: Luke 2:41-52 (GNB)

⁴¹ Every year the parents of Jesus went to Jerusalem for the Passover Festival. 42 When Jesus was twelve years old, they went to the festival as usual. 43 When the festival was over, they started back home, but the boy Jesus stayed in Jerusalem. His parents did not know this; 44 they thought that he was with the group, so they travelled a whole day and then started looking for him among their relatives and friends. 45 They did not find him, so they went back to Jerusalem looking for him. 46 On the third day they found him in the Temple, sitting with the Jewish teachers, listening to them and asking questions. 47 All who heard him were amazed at his intelligent answers. ⁴⁸ His parents were astonished when they saw him, and his mother said to him, "Son, why have you done this to us? Your father and I have been terribly worried trying to find you."

⁴⁹ He answered them, "Why did you have to look for me? Didn't you know that I had to be in my Father's house?" ⁵⁰ But they did not understand his answer.

Reflection: Growing in Grace

This is the last of the stories told by Luke about Jesus as a child. Last week we saw him presented at the temple as an infant. Now he is 12 years old, just a year before he is welcomed into the synagogue as a man.

If you have had the experience of losing your child while shopping or at another point, you'll know what Mary and Joseph went through when they realised Jesus was missing. You'll have experienced the raised voices as you try and locate your child, the raised heartbeat as you contemplate your child being truly lost, and the sheer elation and possibly anger when you finally find your child. All this is there in this passage.

But first a little background on the occasion of this story. 'Every year his parents went to Jerusalem for the feast of the Passover' (v41). It was mandatory for all Jewish men aged thirteen and above to attend the three great Jewish festivals of Passover, Pentecost and Tabernacles (Exodus 23:14-17; 34:23; Deuteronomy 16:16). It was not a requirement for women, but here we see Joseph and Mary attending the festival along with their 12-year-old son, which testifies to Mary's deep devotion. This was a family event. The word in v44 for 'company' was used to describe a travelling party or caravan of people. This large number would have been useful when going through the hostile region of Samaria. It also provided a sense of camaraderie along the way.

It was likely that this was not Jesus' first trip to the holy city, as `Every year his parents went to Jerusalem for the feast of the Passover' (v41), but it was significant as in another year's time Jesus would officially become a `son of the commandment', a full member of the synagogue. But now Jesus would have seen the city jostling with people, merchants selling their wares, and would have experienced the excitement of a major



festival. The week would have flown by for the young lad, his mind absorbed by the Passover and the temple and the Torah. He was so absorbed that `after the feast was over, while his parents were returning home, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem' (v43).

Some might ask how come Mary and Joseph did not know Jesus wasn't with them? I've already mentioned the large caravan of people that Joseph, Mary and Jesus were with. Imagine a large family gathering of all your relatives at the seaside. Children wanting ice-creams, teenagers fed up because they had to be there, parents trying to keep an eye out for the little ones. And then you all make your way back to the hotel or caravan park, but your pre-teen is still down at the beach fascinated by the Punch and Judy or whatever. When travelling en masse in ancient Jewish society children often joined with other children and other families, perhaps with cousins or friends or both. Jesus hadn't given them reason to worry up to this point. We also have to remember here that Jesus was a fully human 12 year old boy, and he learned just as we do. He had to learn about every part of life, including thinking of others. And he was capable of unknowingly causing his parents anxiety concerning his whereabouts.

How might you have felt if you had been Mary and Joseph? Worried sick, I imagine. Imagine losing God's Son! When they realised their son wasn't with them Mary and Joseph returned to Jerusalem. So, it took three days before they found him, three days! Of course Mary and Joseph had gone a day before they realised their son wasn't with them, and then a further day returning to Jerusalem, and then a third day locating their son. In fact in our reading it says in v46 'On the third day they found him in the temple...' I wonder whether Luke wants us to see more than this. Ask yourself, where else in the story of Jesus does it refer to the 'third day'?

So, Jesus was found eventually in the temple, sitting discussing the Law of the Lord with the teachers. Luke tells us that all who heard Jesus were amazed at his intelligent answers. His

understanding at such a young age was extraordinary. Jesus parents, who were not from a highly educated background, were also 'astonished' when they saw him (v48). But they were also hurt by Jesus actions. "Son, why have you done this to us? Your father and I have been terribly worried trying to find you." This is the normal reaction of any parent relieved to find a lost child but angry that they had disappeared.

Here Jesus answer are his first recorded words. "Why did you have to look for me? Didn't you know that I had to be in my Father's house?" Even at this young age, Jesus referred to God as his Father, the temple as his Father's house. Luke again is letting us into the unique relationship of Jesus with God. Even before he became a 'son of the commandment' at 13, Jesus had come to understand something of his unique relationship with God. Here he is in his Father's house, later on he would be about his Father's business.

To grasp the radical nature of Jesus' words here in Luke 2 and the growing self-understanding of Jesus, we need to understand that in the 39 books of the Old Testament, God is only referred to as 'Father' fourteen times, and even then quite impersonally. In those fourteen times `Father' is used in reference to the nation, not to individuals. God was called Abraham's father, but Abraham didn't call God his father. But Jesus at 12 grasps something no-one before him had grasped. More than 60 times the gospels record Jesus calling God `Father.' In these first recorded words of Jesus we see his growing awareness of who he is. And what is more, this awareness was announced in the Jerusalem temple, in the place which was the very heart of Israel's faith. What is the point Luke is making? Jesus is God's Son! God is his Father! In the year before entering adulthood, Jesus knew who he was, and that realisation would become evident to the whole world eighteen years later.

Mary and Joseph didn't understand all this (v50). Despite her great faith and humility it would take Mary years to fully comprehend all this. For now all she wanted was obedience from her son. And that's what happened. `So Jesus went back with



them to Nazareth, where he was obedient to them. His mother treasured all these things in her heart' (v51). What was the result of this obedience? 'Jesus grew both in body and in wisdom, gaining favour with God and people' (v52). The word translated 'favour' is the Greek word 'charis' meaning grace. Jesus was graced in his relationship with God the Father and graced in his relationships with people. Grace characterised his vertical and horizontal relationships.

The way for us to grow in grace with God and people is an obedient spirit, a willing submission to God. Paul writes in Romans 12:1 about us being living sacrifices, and when we sacrifice ourselves for God's glory, his grace is upon us. Paul wrote to the Ephesians, 'Submit to one another out of reverence for Christ' (Ephesians 5:21). This brings us into favour, into grace, with each other. But just as much, when we submit ourselves to serving a lost world for the advancement of the gospel and the glory of Christ, we walk in God's grace, as Jesus demonstrated. Submission is the key to grace and favour with heaven and earth. Being obedient and submissive comes out of knowing who we are. Jesus understood this at 12 years old. He knew who he was in relation to God and that awareness showed in submissiveness to God his Father and his earthly parents.

So I conclude asking you, do you know who you are? If so, will you submit yourself to God and his plan for you? If you do so, you will be walking in grace and will grow in the grace of God.
