Reflection: WHY ARE WE HERE?

(6) To be saved

I haven't met many famous people in my life. When I was a child, I met the host of Record Breakers, Roy Castle, who was performing in a panto I went to with my family. "It's really him" I remember thinking as Roy came out to sign autographs. "It's really him!" is what people would have been saying or thinking as Jesus entered Jerusalem on that first Palm Sunday. There were those who welcomed Jesus as the Messiah, Israel's true king. There were, of course, those who were not so sure.

Just before our reading from Mark 11 we have the healing of Bartimaeus, who was blind. "Go," said Jesus, "your faith has healed you." Immediately he received his sight and followed Jesus along the road.' (Mk. 10:52). Can you imagine the sense of anticipation which the crowd would have felt as they approached Jerusalem? I can imagine Bartimaeus was there singing and shouting in praise of Jesus. Those who



witnessed this healing would also have been exuberant and maybe even sensing something great was about to happen.

Now that sense of excitement is added to by the fact that Jesus and his disciples, together with a large crowd are making their way up from Jericho to Jerusalem. Have you ever been on a journey where you are elated to have arrived? The walk from Jericho to Jerusalem involves a long, hard climb because Jericho is the lowest city on earth, about 800 feet below sea level. Jerusalem, only a dozen or so miles away, is nearly 3000 feet above sea level. The road from Jericho to Jerusalem goes through hot, dry desert all the way until you reach the Mount of Olives. Imagine with such a climb the sense of anticipation and relief when you reach the top and get into the city itself, not to mention the weariness.

Now add to that sense of excitement the feeling that all Jewish pilgrims would have felt every time they went up to Jerusalem for a festival. They were coming to the place where the living God had chosen to place his name and his presence. It was Passover time, that great Jewish festival where they remember and celebrate the freedom God won for them out of the hand of Egypt. It was also time to look forward as well as backward, to the time when God would usher in his kingdom, when the great hope of freedom would finally be revealed. The crowd felt that the long climb up to Jerusalem this time was a climb to be present at God's coming kingdom.

There is a sense that as Christians today we also long to see signs of God's coming kingdom. In one respect we are no different from that Palm Sunday crowd.

Now everything Mark tells us is designed to emphasize this sense of hope in the kingdom of God about to come with Jesus as the world's true king, who rides into the city on a colt commandeered for just this purpose. The whole part about sending two disciples ahead to get the colt is a way saying Jesus has authority commandeer it. That the people witnessing this asked "Why are you doing this?" (v5) and 'the people let them go' with the colt (v6) shows Jesus had authority to act. This is the coming king! We don't know whether Jesus had arranged this ahead of time or not. That isn't Mark's reason for noting it in his account. Neither is Mark interested in this act of riding a donkey as a sign of humility. That's Matthew's concern, not Mark's. Mark is concerned with the coming kingdom and Jesus' sovereign authority.

When were you last genuinely excited? Maybe you're excited for the end of lockdown and being able to go out and resume some sort of life. Maybe you're excited to be able to attend worship next Sunday, Easter Day. Maybe you're excited about what God has done in your life or is doing in your life. When was the last time you were really excited about what God is doing in your life?

In 1964 Martha and the Vandellas sang `Dancing in the street' which for me is very much an anthem of the 60's. I think it captured the excitement and hope of the 60's. Well, I don't know whether anyone was dancing in the streets of Jerusalem as Jesus entered, but there was surely a great sense of excitement in the coming kingdom and Jesus as the coming king. The climax of this passage emphasises this. You



didn't spread your cloak on a dusty road or cut down branches from the trees or vegetation from the fields for anyone, just because you were excited. You would only do this to welcome a king.

Two hundred years before, Judas defeated Maccabaeus Antiochus Epiphanes, the Syrian king. He entered Jerusalem and cleansed and rebuilt the Temple, and as he entered the city people waved ivy and palm branches as they sang hymns of praise. Judas Maccabaeus started a royal dynasty that lasted a hundred years (cf. 2 Maccabees 10:1-9; compare 1 Maccabees 13:51).

Mark wants to make the point from his gospel account clear. From chapter 8 onwards, the disciples have believed that Jesus is the true and rightful king of the Jews, on his way to Jerusalem to be hailed as the nation's true king. Now as they arrive in the capital, the disciples and the crowd believe this is the moment of Jesus' royal reception.

The shouts of the disciples and the crowd show this is what they understood this moment to mean. "Hosanna!" (v9) is a Hebrew word which mixes exuberant praise to God with the prayer that God will save his people immediately. Their singing of these words is taken from Psalm 118, which is a Psalm that is also about going up to the Temple in Jerusalem.

"Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" is an Aramaic and Hebrew way of saying `welcome!' But they also welcome Jesus with a dangerous prayer "Blessed is the coming kingdom of our father David!" (v10). That is what this scene is all about – as the readers of Mark's gospel have known for some time and certainly since the healing of Bartimaeus. Jesus is the true king of the Jews, David's heir who is ushering his kingdom.

With such a sense of anticipation and expectancy, the story then ends on somewhat of a damp squib. Jesus enters the city and the Temple, looks around and then leaves! (v11). Mark leaves us in suspense. What will the true king do to make his presence felt in the city?

Over the coming chapters we see that Jesus radically redefines what it means to be the world's true King. Hosanna will become a reality. 'Save us, Lord' is exactly what Jesus comes to do, but not in the way they expect or want. Jesus will usher in his kingdom by means of a cross not a throne.

This passage should raise questions for us too. Are we ready to follow him lock stock and barrel? Are we ready to obey him even when his orders puzzle us? Are we ready to go out of our way to honour him, to offer exuberant praise? Or do we really want to domesticate Jesus, have him on our own terms, someone to help us through life and do for us the things we want to do anyway? Do we want someone to provide us with only comforting spiritual experiences or someone whom we will serve with our whole lives?

Jesus comes to save. Just as Jesus healed Bartimaeus and others, do you need a touch of hope or healing from the world's true king?

Maybe you need to ask him for a renewed excitement in following him. Maybe you need just to be still and listen to his voice



through the Scriptures and by his Holy Spirit. Let's pray.
